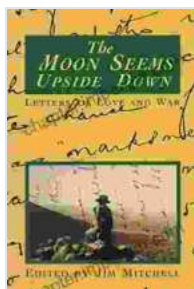

We are fighting for a just cause, and we will not be defeated. We will drive the Nazis out of France, and we will restore freedom to Europe.

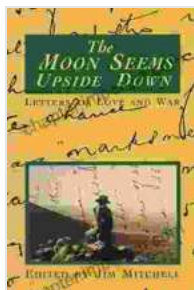
I know that you are worried about me, but please do not despair. I am safe and well, and I am determined to come home to you.

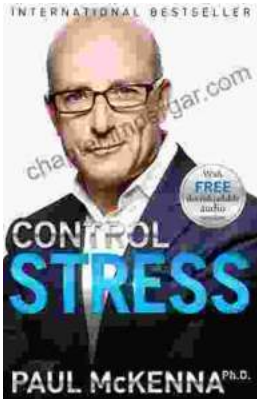
