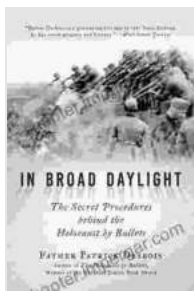

The Einsatzgruppen: Instruments of Genocide

The Scale of the Genocide

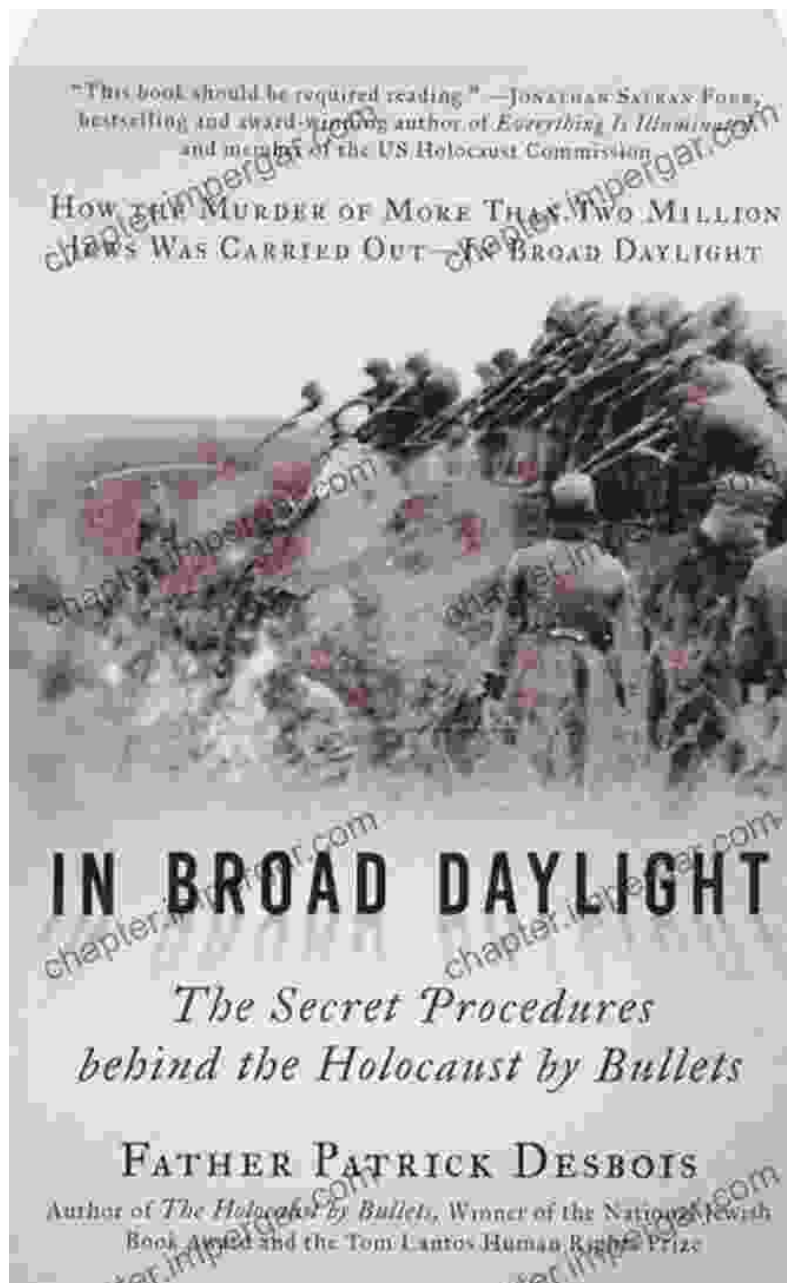

The Holocaust by bullets is a haunting reminder of the depths of human cruelty and the horrors that can be perpetrated in the name of ideology.

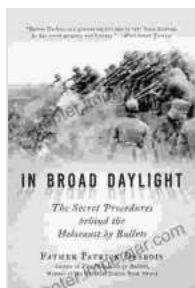
